CIVIL WAR VETERAN AND PIONEER DIES

**BENJAMIN FRANKLIN ESTES
PASSED AWAY EARLY SAT-
URDAY MORNING**

Benjamin Franklin Estes, aged 86,
passed away on Saturday morning at
7 o'clock, at the family residence
1208 Ivy street, after a long, use-
ful life, most of which was spent in
the west, which he loved and has
made his home in since the close of
the Civil War. The decedant is sur-
vived by a family of seven children.

Born in North Carolina, August 6,
1835, Mr. Estes had just reached his
eighty-sixth year on the day of his
death, and had led an active, upright
life; was one of that hard band of
early pioneers who helped to blaze
the way for the first settlers through
the west, and on coming to Miles City
thirty-eight years ago became one of
the leading citizens in the old Cow-
town, but having suffered the loss of
his eyesight about fifteen years ago
he has been confined to his home
much of the time since.

Prior to coming to Miles City with
his family in 1883 Mr. Estes served
throughout the Civil War with dis-
tinction and on being discharged from
the northern forces, in Dakota terri-
tory, at the close of the war served
for some time longer as a government
scout during the Indian campaign
which followed.

Funeral services for the aged man
and pioneer will be held on Monday
morning at 8 o'clock at the Sacred
Heart church, and will be conducted
by the Rev. Fr. J. J. O'Carroll, with
Undertaker M. H. Wallace in charge
of the arrangements. Interment will
be in the Mount Calvary cemetery.
The members of Custer post of the
American Legion will attend the ser-
vices in a body and will accord the
memory of the deceased all the
honors due a veteran and comrade
of a former war.

NEW YORK**

**MAKING ACCURATE SURVEY OF
HOTELS AND ROAD CON-

Rev. C. E. Brugler, a retired clergy-
man of New York, accompanied by
Mrs. Brugler, arrived in the city late
Friday evening, and after a short
stop in the city left again on Satur-
day to continue their trip around the
world. Rev. Brugler has been appoint-
ed by the American Automobile club
of New York, which is to American
travel what the Royal Touring club of
London is to travel on the European
continent, as its special representa-
tive on a trip which will circle the
globe.

Rev. Brugler, in the interests of the
A. A. C., is making an accurate sur-
vey of hotel accommodations and
road conditions all along the way,
and the magnitude of his undertak-
ing may be realized from the fact that
his reports will deal with his present
transcontinental trip, a side trip from
Seattle to Alaska and return to Los
Angeles, then to the Hawaiian is-
lands, on across the Pacific to Egypt
From Cairo, Rev. and Mrs. Brugler
will journey in their specially con-
structed Buick roadster to the cape,
through Asia Minor, and home thru
Europe. En route to Seattle they plan
to visit Yellowstone park.

Mrs. Brugler is accompanying her
husband the entire distance, on this,
their second circumnavigation of the
globe, and both had many interesting
and unusual experiences on their last
long journey. They appeared very
favorably impressed by the appear-
ance of Miles City, its cleanliness,
well lighted streets and the courtesy
of the people with whom they came
in contact during their stay here.

While in the city they were guests
at the Olive hotel and before taking
their departure they assured Jos. E.
Hurley, the genial manager, that
Miles City and the hotel would re-
ceive a special mention in their next
report to the A. A. C., which will be
printed in the club's publication. The
Olive, they said, was about the only
hotel they have found which still
maintains its old time atmosphere.
